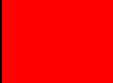
Assessment of hazards associated with running a public bat walk in open space. To be used in conjunction with site risk assessment.

General emergency	Injury	Supervisor Participant Public	Supervisors to be aware of nearest Accident and Emergency hospital; A first aid kit must be on site at all times; A mobile phone should be available at all times (if no/poor signal, all supervisors should know the location of the nearest landline); A safety plan should be completed for all sessions; All incidents and near misses to be recorded in an accident book and reported to BDBC	1	4	4	Supervisor
Low visibility	Getting lost/ separated from group Injury	Participant (including children)	Event supervisors and volunteers to be introduced at the beginning of the walk and to wear high vis; Designated front and back marker to be in position at all times; Supervisor to do a head count at the beginning and end of walk; Children to be accompanied by a responsible adult; Participants advised to bring torches and to remain with group; Muster point communicated.	1	4	4	Supervisor Participant

Trip hazards/obstructions along route	Slips trips and falls Scratches Eye injury	Supervisor Participant (including children)	Route to be reced several days in advance of walk to ensure no overhanging branches or major trip hazards; Any obstructions that cannot be cleared/cut back to be marked on the evening to avoid injury.	2	3	6	Supervisor
Inclement Weather	Hypothermia Discomfort	Supervisor Participant (including children)	Appropriate clothing to be worn for the weather – bat walks usually undertaken on mild evenings, but temperature can plummet later at night, so advise participants to bring layers; Cancel bat walk in event of persistent rain.	2	3	6	Supervisor Participant
Traffic	Collision Death	Supervisor Participant (including children)	Plan walk route so it is largely or entirely off road; Ensure there are stewards either side of crossings and acting as front and back markers; Event supervisors to wear high vis and carry torches; Children to be accompanied by an adult.	1	5	5	Supervisor Participant
Water courses	Drowning Hypothermia	Supervisor Participant (including children)	If walking alongside watercourses, ensure participants are briefed about safety by water; Participants to buddy up; Children accompanied by a responsible adult; Use a front and back marker at all times; Bring a throw line in case of emergency.	1	4	4	Supervisor Participant
Bat detecting equipment	Injury	Supervisor Participant (including children)	Participants briefed on how to use bat detectors correctly; Volume dials to be kept low to avoid noise exposure over time with higher frequencies.	1	2	2	Supervisor Participant
Suspicious characters	Personal attack	Supervisor Participant (including children)	Participants advised to remain with the group at all times; Supervisors to be vigilant about possible anti-social night time activity and to divert route if a situation has the potential to escalate; High vis and torches to be used by supervisors and volunteers to avoid startling anyone; Supervisor to have a charged mobile phone at all times; If there is any concern about behaviour, call 999.	1	4	4	Supervisor Participant

	<b>If control measures are followed as described, risk factor is low enough to continue</b>
	<b>Hazard carries a moderate level of risk. Attempt to eliminate or isolate hazard; if this can't be done, decide whether task is essential and who is competent to ensure it is carried out safely. Additional control measures may be necessary</b>
	<b>Hazard is very high risk. Unless it can be isolated/eliminated, do not carry out task. Find alternative solution.</b>
